Norma Baharu Sesi Persekolahan Sekolah Sri UCSI Menengah

Selepas hampir tiga bulan sekolah diarahkan tutup dalam tempoh Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan (PKP), diikuti Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan Bersyarat (PKPB) akibat penularan pandemik Covid-19, Sekolah Sri UCSI memulakan sesi persekolahan semula pada tarikh 15 Julai 2020 iaitu dalam tempoh Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan Pemulihan (PKPP).

Perasaan gembira berbaur khuatir pasti dirasai golongan pelajar, guru dan ibu bapa, namun dengan kes Covid-19 yang semakin terkawal, pembukaan ini diyakini berjalan lancar berpandukan prosedur operasi standard (SOP) ketat yang ditetapkan Kementerian Kesihatan (KKM). Dengan persiapan rapi yang dilaksanakan pihak Sekolah Sri UCSI serta pematuhan Garis Panduan Pengurusan Pembukaan Semula Sekolah, pembukaan sektor pendidikan dilihat penting bagi pelajar meneruskan proses menimba ilmu bagi kecemerlangan diri untuk mencapai cita-cita yang diimpikan.

Antara SOP pembukaan semula sekolah adalah pemeriksaan suhu setiap hari. Pemeriksaaan suhu dibuat iaitu sebelum masuk sekolah, sewaktu aktiviti pengajaran dan pemudahcaraan dan sebelum waktu pulang bagi pelajar di setiap tingkatan. Guru, kakitangan sekolah dan individu yang mempunyai urusan dengan pihak sekolah juga akan diambil suhu. Bagi mereka dengan suhu badan melebihi 37.5 darjah Celsius atau bergejala tidak akan dibenarkan memasuki kawasan sekolah dan aktiviti di luar bilik darjah, seperti sukan dan kokurikulum secara bersemuka tidak dilaksanakan sehingga ke suatu tarikh yang akan dimaklumkan oleh pihak Kementerian Pendidikan Malaysia (KPM).

Selain itu, SOP yang diambil kira adalah pemakaian 'mask' dan penggunaan 'hand sanitizer' yang menjadi rutin harian untuk pelajar, guru dan kakitangan sekolah menggunakannya. Penjarakan sosial sepanjang 1 meter turut diambil kira di dalam kelas dan laluan pelajar untuk ke kelas, lab dan tandas turut dibuat bagi memudahkan pelajar bergerak dalam keadaan teratur. Guru memainkan peranan yang sangat penting dalam memastikan pelajar menerima norma baharu yang diperkenalkan oleh pihak Kementerian Pendidikan Malaysia (KPM).





Sri UCSI School Session For Primary Students

The atmosphere was one of calm and order as Primary 1 & 2 students returned to school 3 months after the Ministry of Education had directed all schools shut in the face of the Covid 19 pandemic in mid March 2020.

Our primary students, reported on their first day of school, 22 July 2020. Watched by their visibly composed parents, these students lined at the foyer as their temperatures were immediately scanned and recorded by duty teachers before being ushered to their respective classrooms by their class teacher.

The Movement Control Order (MCO) imposed nationwide brought about global change in the behavioral patterns of people; birthing the 'new normal' under the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP).


Sri UCSI School rigidly complied with the SOP as outlined by the MOE about a month before school reopened. Every classroom, Science Laboratories & the Home Science Room were sanitized and a bottle of hand sanitizer was placed in these rooms. Social distancing measures too were imposed with students' tables arranged 3 feet apart and with their name labeled on their individual table. An isolation room was also prepared in the event of a student feeling unwell. Specific pathways were marked out and mapped in two directions for students to navigate and strictly adhere to.

Teachers were to ensure that these young children frequently washed their hands, particularly after use of the washrooms and before meals. Students were also reminded to put on their mask whenever they were out of their classroom. Every student's temperature was scanned and recorded three times daily; at 7.30am, 12.30pm and 3.30pm by teachers on duty and by their respective subject teachers. In the event of a temperature reading being above the norm of 37.5 degrees Celcius, the teacher concerned was to immediately report the matter to the Senior Assistant and isolate the student in the isolation room before alerting the parents.

Morning break time and lunch time prepacked meals for students were brought up to their classrooms for them. These freshly prepared meals were digitally ordered a week before they reported to school from a menu of two options. During both of these break times, the last subject teacher sat through in class with the students as they ate their meal. Lessons flowed smoothly throughout the day.

The dismissal time at 3.30pm saw parents waiting anxiously to take their children home safely. It was a sigh of relief for teachers as the first day for the primary students slipped by without any glitch.

Parent Communication and Engagement Expectation

A huge thank you to our parents for making great effort to attend Sri UCSI Springhill Parents' Briefing and Forum on Saturday, 15th August. We are extremely delighted to see parents discussing constructive strategies to support learning at home and also to stretch your children's potential to greater heights. Thank you to those who have expressed their gratitude to teachers for taking a sincere initiative to encourage the students to discuss action plans that help with the students' progress. It was encouraging to see constructive and effective session that has boost family involvement to help promote positive outcomes in supporting our students' learning and growth at Sri UCSI Springhill Campus.

Communication plays a key role in creating and fostering strong, positive relationships between school and the home. As explained during the Parents' Briefing, we will improve school-home communication by offering a standard format, structure and sequence for regular, ongoing communication.

During the period of Movement Control Order, we understand the convenience of utilising WhatsApp Groups as a communication tool with Parents and Students. However, with immediate effect, WhatsApp does not fall into the realm of official communication channels endorsed by the School. Any communications will be done through official channels as below:



Class Teacher/Home Room Teacher

 The Class Teacher/Home Room Teacher should be the first point of contact when there is any level of concern. These teachers will have the most contact with the students at school and are in the best position to discuss their progress.

Meeting Teachers

- Teachers are happy to meet with parents if a prior appointment has been arranged.
- Whatsapp to teachers' private phone number is not encouraged. School will ensure there is consistent communication through official channels.
- Please avoid speaking to teachers just before classes begin as this encroaches into crucial learning time. Please note that academic staff prioritise their time with their classes during working hours and may not be able to respond after school ends

3. Student Organiser (Primary)

- All Primary children have a Student Planner. It is the responsibility of the child to take this home each day and to bring it back to school the following day.
- Students are required to take their planners to each lesson.
- Notes should be referred via the class/form teacher in the first instance. Class teachers may refer any notes to the relevant key person(s) depending on the matter raised.
- Parents of Primary students are kindly asked to look at the Planner every day and acknowledge any notes from the teacher(s) by replying or signing next to the note.
- Similarly, notes in the Planner will be checked and acknowledged by the teacher, so please feel free to use the Planner to write non-confidential messages to the teacher, including a note when your child returns to school after an absence.
- The Planner should not, however, be used for confidential messages.

4. Meet & Greet Sessions

- These will be held at the start of the year where we invite parents to meet the teachers (Class Teachers & Subject Teachers) and the leadership of the School.
- It is an opportunity for parents to find out more about year group and school expectations.

Parent Forums

- We invite parents to come to share their thoughts about the School or ask any general questions that they may have once each term.
- The sessions will be informal with members of the Academic team present.

Parent Information Meetings (PIM)

 These may have once each term and cover different aspects of learning and teaching.

7. Notices / Circulars

 Notices / Circulars for parents to keep up-to-date with upcoming events, news and important notices and announcements.

11. Online Platforms

The future of teaching and learning will not happen only in the classroom but also wherever the student is. The School will be exploring to create collaborative classrooms, connect in personal learning communities, communicate with school staff, communicate with students more easily via online platforms e.g. Microsoft Education or Google Education. We will be connecting with all parents and students regarding this in due course.





Effective communication strategies involve initiation, timeliness, consistency and frequency, follow-through, clarity and usefulness of communication. Every effort should be made to respond in a timely manner, whether the response is required from the home to school or school to the home. Generally, families can expect a response by the end of school or within one to two working days.

We are obliged to comply with the Malaysian Personal Data Protection Act (PDPA) 2010. Therefore, we do have the accountability and responsibility to the personal data that is being processed on behalf of the school. Without a lawful basis, the sharing of personal information with third party outside school is not allowed.





Moving Forward

1. Lockers

All students will be allocated a locker at Level 1 in which to keep their personal possessions. The locker is intended to provide reasonable security for books and other necessary educational equipment that a student needs to bring to school. Students are expected to keep their lockers closed and in a clean, hygienic and tidy condition. Teachers are authorised to make regular inspections in the presence of the students. They are not intended for valuable or expensive items of personal property that should be left at home. The School will not take responsibility in the event of loss.



The School will be realigning the timetables to be adequately and equitably distributed, depending on the recommended number of periods and the subjects in the curriculum. Provision for core subjects will be increased.

3. Resources

UCSI Springhill Campus hosts two schools: UCSI International School which offers IB programme and Sekolah Sri UCSI which offers the Malaysian National Curriculum. Despite the differing curricula and two different calendar years, we will be collaborating in terms of resources across campus to provide students with a better learning environment.

4. ICT & Digital Literacy

School has the aim to develop concerned, dynamic and progressive individuals with an ICT culture that values knowledge and ethics towards the technological advancement of the nation. Our students will develop the digital skills such as making educated decisions about the information that they encounter online, respond and evaluate technology of the future, create increasingly sophisticated documents and presentations, how to become positive contributors to the digital world and using digital technology safely and protect their own physical and emotional wellbeing.

5. Effective Teaching & Learning

We believe that supporting teachers in their professional development leads to improved outcomes for our students. Good quality training and reflective practice are essential parts of a teacher's professional life. Lesson observations will be carried out regularly to mentor teachers to be more effective in the delivery of their lessons in class. We will be conducting INSET workshops for teachers regularly to improve and "fine tune" present skills for teaching and learning.











OUR APPROACHES TO TEACHING AND LEARNING POST-COVID

An avalanche of change, 2020 an unprecedented time in this modern day in history. An era where we the teachers, our students and parents have to accept a new vision and a different concept of the process of learning. This pandemic forced us to evolve and reshape ourselves to be assimilated in this world. An abrupt change to unlearn and relearn and how to adapt reflective teaching in this era. In the physical world of teaching in school, teachers are in power in areas of teaching, learning and connection in school. Now, we shift our teaching to work in harmony with students and parents to transcend the physical classroom learning to hybrid learning.

Planning for continuity of learning. The Questions.

The what, how and why. What type of audience we are targeting? What pedagogical philosophies are we adopting? What types of systems and the ever evolving technologies and tools needed? How to make better teacher decisions in times of a crisis like this? How to provide meaningful learning experiences to the targeted audience. Most importantly how to remain calm. To facilitate this sudden shift from physical space to virtual space, we need to be ready and adapt to changes. Video calling, use of social media, web conferencing, email, WhatsApp and digital platforms which we quickly add to our vocabulary. Dojo – now we are introduced to Google Classroom, Microsoft Team, and Zoom.

Delivery of higher education programmes.

We are no longer the main actors. Virtual learning, students take centre stage. We need to design the learning, to promote students' diversification of roles, a gradual shift to being more independent learners. Learning is about liberating the minds of the students, the freedom to express their thoughts. Take charge of their learning and the outcome. They then become the curators of knowledge, become content producers by choosing the fabrics, the designs laid by the educators.

Core teaching skills.

As the learning designers for students, some of the core teaching skills we adapt are- illustrate, stimulus variation, reinforcement, classroom management, white board, introduction of a lesson, probing questions, explaining. Macro teaching skills- Introduction, probing questions, explanation, stimulus variation, whiteboard writing, achieving closure. Using these various tools enable us to be better facilitators. Students have different views, different schemata so we as teachers need to understand our students and engage them as individuals not as a collective teaching package. So when using hybrid learning mediums, we must use all skills to engage a student. Learning is all about them NOT us. We must cater to our students not them to us.
